Each pair guided viewers through story of Hidden Acres and our many the different program offerings. They showed videos, told stories, interviewed special guests, and explained our Development Campaign projects to viewers while also challenging people to give financially to those projects.

At 8pm when everything was totaled, God provided \$208,189. Amen! While that total does not cover the total cost of the two projects (\$850,000), it's a good start to build on with the rest of our fundraising season still to come. Two big pieces of this season are year-end giving and our Annual Gala.

We planned a big party for a Sunday in February, with tons of fellowship, a delicious meal, a guest speaker, and three different types of auctions. This summer we are going to be studying the Exodus story and how it connects with the gospel story presented in the New Testament. We are excited to spend lots of time studying the Old Testament and seeing how God has been working throughout the generations to bring salvation to the world. Campers will see how God is with them during every stage of life.



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Our Vision for Summer Camp

Our summer camp program aims to be extremely intentional about accomplishing our vision of **providing camp experiences**, **sharing the gospel**, **and equipping Christ-followers**. We do this by creating a safe environment where both campers and staff can grow spiritually, personally, & relationally. Here are a few ways we do that:

- 1. Camp is disconnected. Camp is a set apart space, removed from the hustle and routine of daily life. We facilitate this environment in a number of ways. Campers and staff do not have access to their phones during the week, enabling them to connect with each other on a deeper level. Also by design, camp is literally "set apart" from everywhere—where campers experience creation and nature in ways quite different from most of their daily lives. In these and other ways, everyone is freed to wrestle with and practice their faith away from the normal distractions of life.
- 2. Camp is experiential. Our unique camp experiences are a tool to point campers toward Jesus. Campers don't just observe, they participate. Campers are given the opportunity to read the Bible for themselves. Campers are encouraged to practice loving their neighbor with their cabin mates. Lessons are turned into experience, and experience into lessons. At the same time, our staff gain experience sharing the gospel, serving others, depending on God, teaching Scripture, and so much more. Our goal is that everyone will use the skills they practiced at camp to serve Christ in their church, family, school, and community.
- **3.** Camp is relational. Campers and staff enter into a new, temporary community during the summer. The camp experience is lived out with others; no one walks alone at camp. This community is nurtured primarily through intentional mentorship. All campers and staff are mentored by someone who encourages them toward spiritual, relational, and personal growth.
- 4. Camp is faith-centered. Daily schedules, devotions, activities, and even meals are intentionally designed to point campers to Jesus. Counselors are taught to share the gospel with every camper every day and nurture their faith. We call this "planting and watering seeds." Whether during a devotion, a conversation while walking, at a meal, or while playing a game, counselors always look for opportunities to share and equip.

We asked 2,500 campers about their experience at camp this summer, and 92% said they grew in their faith in some capacity. We had 248 campers say they put their faith in Jesus for the first time while at camp. Obviously, we don't measure our success by numbers like these, since we know the Holy Spirit is always working in the hearts of people in ways we can't understand. However, it is encouraging and exciting to see some of the amazing miracles God has worked in staff and campers' lives. Here is what one of our summer staff members had to say about what God did in their life while at camp:

"He taught me ultimate dependency on Him. God taught me that His timing is perfect over and over again. I tried to weave the gospel into everything, but it was always when I was least expecting it that a conversation would take place and a camper would come to know our Lord as their Savior. Through our [staff] study of the book of Philippians, God began the work of helping me to deny myself. I struggled with wanting recognition for what I was doing, but that is not why I was serving this summer. The very things we were teaching our campers, He made me aware that I needed the same lessons. Only God is worthy of praise."
